Welcome to MimeLondon, an occasional series of curated international physical and visual theatre. The 2026 season runs 21-31 January.

Like our previous, long-running venture, London International Mime Festival, MimeLondon promotes work that's edgy and unusual, created and performed by exceptional artists. As well as performance and film, the season offers specialist workshops led by experts in their fields.

Scheduled building work at the Barbican makes this longstanding partner venue's theatres unavailable to us this January, but we're excited to be collaborating with Sadler's Wells East for the first time, plus regular venues The Peacock, The Place and Shoreditch Town Hall. In the present, artistically risk-averse climate we thank all our venue partners for their enthusiastic support in bringing the excitement of new forms and experiment to London audiences.

Is it too late to stop, to go back, to fall in love, to start again?




Ockham's Razor returns with an intimate duet crafted and performed by its two Artistic Directors, Alex Harvey and Charlotte Mooney. For 20 years they have been making circus together, lifting, catching and carrying; stepping on and around each other. They have dropped each other and picked each other up.

Featuring two performers and a suspended frame: this is a show about creation and compromise. An irreverent, highly physical and heartfelt dive into navigating a relationship and the negotiation involved in making stuff.



Murray & Evans Lecture

Reclaiming mime from the condescension of posterity

This talk by **Mark Evans** and **Simon Murray** will be presented in the form of a performative conversation around the themes, ideas, perceptions, contexts, personalities, histories and controversies enshrined in their recently published book, *Mime into Physical Theatre: a UK Cultural History 1970 – 2000*.

Mark and Simon will reflect on how and why mime has often been the object of derision or disdain from both the university sector and – in a different way – within popular culture. They will consider the complex cultural conditions which framed and gave rise to these practices, and some of the key figures (both artists and other cultural workers) and organisations involved in performing and enabling this work. Drawing upon their own experiences as professional performers, teachers and theatre makers in the 1980s and '90s, and later as academics, they will offer a blend of analysis, history, personal stories and documentation in relation to mime and its bastard and unruly child, physical theatre.

Their conversation will reflect on the intersections between gender, class, sexuality and race in the making and performing of this work, the significance of often heated debates about training for mime and physical theatre, and the reasons for the campaigning zeal of mime activists in the late '70s and '80s in Scotland, Wales and across the UK, including, of course, in London and the South East.



Mark Evans is Professor of Theatre Training and Education at Coventry University. After training in Paris with Jacques Lecoq, Philippe Gaulier and Monika Pagneux in the early 1980s, Mark worked on the London Fringe until moving full-time into teaching. He has published widely on Jacques Copeau, Jacques Lecoq, UK mime and physical theatre, and actor and performer training. He wrote the critical introduction to the 2020 edition of Jacques Lecoq's seminal book 'The Moving Body'.

Simon Murray is Honorary Senior Research Fellow in Theatre Studies at the University of Glasgow. He trained with Philippe Gaulier and Monika Pagneux in Paris (1986/87) and was a professional performer and theatre maker for 12 years working in the fields of mime and physical theatre.



Hilarious sight gags and jaw-dropping
stunt work, in a double-bill of Buster Keaton
comedies, screened with live piano from John
Sweeney.

Though clocking in at under an hour, *Sherlock Jr* (1924) is the match of any of Keaton's feature-length films, with an ingenious central conceit that doubles as a reflection on cinema itself. In it, he plays a dreamy projectionist who one day falls asleep on the job, leaves his body, and walks into the screen and into the film he is projecting.

Rhyming the surreal with the Kafkaesque, we screen *Sherlock Jr* with the earlier *Cops* (1922) in which Keaton, mistaken for a bomb-throwing anarchist, is chased across LA by hordes of police officers – the very image of an unfairly pursued hero vs. the implacable faceless forces of authority.

Vamos Theatre, the UK's leading full mask theatre company, is holding a one-off talent development residency as part of this MimeLondon season. Delivered by Vamos Theatre's Artistic Director Rachael Savage, *Revealing the Mask* is a workshop for everyone, especially actors, performers and theatre practitioners, a creative, high energy and inspiring physical session that will give participants a thorough introduction to full mask technique.

Through exercises and shared exploration, the workshop introduces mask characterisation, mask physicality, and techniques such as clocking, stillness and isolation, helping to build confidence and understanding of mask performance.

More advanced full mask skills and a deeper understanding of the form will also be covered, through exploring devising in full mask individually, and as a mask ensemble. Vamos Theatre devises and tours accessible, humorous and fearless work which showcases the best in full mask performance.

The company is dedicated to making work based on stories of real people, and productions are rooted in true-life experiences and events. At the heart of Vamos Theatre's ethos is a commitment to working practices that engender genuineness, generosity, respect and consideration of others.

Nola's workshop will be an insight into how to work without text, paying special attention to becoming an articulate mover able to express visual ideas with maximum clarity. All parts of the body (and mind) will come into play. There will be mime, improvisation, eccentric moves and fancy footwork. Students will have the chance to discover aspects of the clown that are universal, as well as exclusive to themselves. The aim will be to build a character that is not trying to be funny but just is.

Suitable for the enthusiastic student of visual comedy, professional or amateur, who is reasonably fit and not afraid to move.

Students must wear loose fitting clothes and flexible shoes. Bring one juggling ball. Red noses optional.



Born in Sydney, Nola Rae immigrated to London in 1963. Trained at the Royal Ballet School in London, she danced at Malmö Stadsteater and at Tivoli Pantomime Theatre in Copenhagen before turning to mime, studying with Marcel Marceau in Paris. In 1974 she founded the London Mime Theatre with her partner Matthew Ridout and premiered her first solo show in France at the Nancy Festival in 1975. To date Nola has toured her work to 69 countries.

As a teacher, she has lead mime and clowning workshops worldwide. With Joseph Seelig, Nola instigated the London International Mime Festival which presented ground-breaking visual performance from 1977 to 2023. In 2008 she was appointed an M.B.E. for her services to Drama and to Mime by the late Queen Elizabeth II.

For this week-long intensive workshop, our leading question will be: how to extend the realm of what's possible for the actor on stage?

Inspired by the work of Etienne Decroux and his assistants, as well as building on Theatre Re's critically acclaimed repertoire, we will explore concrete ways to unlock the full expressive potential of the body. Through playful and rigorous training, participants will learn how to use liberating and clear vocabularies to create highly physical work.

Each day will begin with physical conditioning, then progress towards ensemble work, technique, repertoire, and culminate in the opportunity to devise a short presentation true to the Theatre Re process.

This five-day workshop is led by Guillaume Pigé (Theatre Re Director and RADA Associate Teacher) along with core Theatre Re members. It is designed for professional and semi-professional performers, actors, dancers as well as visual artists, students and recent graduates. No previous experience of Corporeal Mime is required to join, only your curiosity and playfulness.

Guillaume Pigé is the Artistic Director and founder of Theatre Re. Originally from France, he has been living in the UK for the past 18 years. He trained with theatre



makers and directors such as Andrew Visnevski, Steven Wasson, Corinne Soum, Daniel Stein and Thomas Leabhart.

His practice looks at intimate, difficult to talk about and sometimes taboo life experiences, and turns them into moving, viscerally physical, visually striking poetic theatre to address global human challenges.

His work has been performed in more than seventeen countries, notably at The Cervantino Festival (Mexico), Hong Kong Arts Festival, New Victory Theater (USA), National Taichung Theatre (Taiwan), National Centre for Performing Arts (China) and London International Mime Festival (UK). He has been an Associate Teacher at RADA since 2011 and is regularly invited to give workshops about Theatre Re's creative process and physical language throughout the UK and internationally.

This 2-day Puppetry intensive will explore the relationship between the visible performer and the puppet/object on stage. It will consider what an actor or dancer or puppeteer needs to focus on when sharing the stage with an animated object, including presence, focus, manipulation techniques and poetic metaphor. It will introduce the participants to a wide range of styles of puppetry including 3 person operated figures.

Sue Buckmaster is the Artistic Director of the award-winning Theatre-Rites, a puppetry expert, author and dramaturg and the fifth generation of theatre practitioners in her family. She has directed over 30 theatre and site-specific productions for Theatre-Rites within the UK and internationally, as well as directing both Chotto Desh and Chotto Xenos for the Akram Khan Company.
